WEEKLY UPDATE:

1. Blue Zones Visit: Healthways and Blue Zones Staff will be visiting our community on 6/24 and 6/25. On the 25th, City Staff and Policy Committee members will meet with the delegation and then provide a tour of built environment changes/projects. On June 26th, the team will be shooting a video on Muscatine that we will be able to use to market Muscatine as well as Healthways and Blue Zones. More details to below.
2. NFPA: The March 2014 NFPA Fire Experience Survey is attached for your information.
3. Downtown Banners: We are working with the Downtown Action Alliance, Chamber and MPW on the banner program for various events or festivals. The plan is to place the banners at the intersections. The Chamber will be the application site.
