

City Administrator Report to Mayor & City Council

WEEKLY UPDATE:

1. Budget: REMINDER: We will meet briefly on Tuesday, February 17th at 5:30pm to set the public hearing for the budget.
2. Legislative Day: The following link provides details on the February Legislative Day hosted by the Iowa League of Cities. I will be attending this year's events (and I will be staying for the league board meeting the following day). 3. MPW: The high school traffic signal concrete foundation strength test failed. MPW is pulling together a meeting with the contractor this week to determine next steps, which will involve a new foundation. MPW received approval for a 6 month extension of the TSIP grant for the signals on Cedar Street.
4. Fire: Please see the attached NFPA Fire Experience Survey for January 2015.
5. MFPSI: Per Terry Slattery, CEBS, MFPSI Executive Director - On Monday, the full Senate State Government Committee passed out SSB 1126 which is the bill that re-establishes the state contribution to MFPSI at the 3.79% rate and also includes a \$9.8 million appropriation to be paid to us in FY2015. The study bill now becomes a Senate File and has been assigned the number SF188. I have provided a link to the wording of SF188 which is identical to the previous study bill. 6. Public Works: Please see the following information provided by Director Hill - On February 10, 2015, staff held a post-event snow meeting with the City's Equipment Operators. The following information was discussed:
 - Equipment: One salt spreader is not functioning but parts are on order and the spreader should be repaired soon. All other equipment is operational.
 - Manpower: We learned that using Collection & Drainage staff to operate our one ton trucks with plows and spreaders was extremely efficient. Dump Trucks were able to stay on their routes while the smaller trucks were dispatched to address specific areas of problems. We intend to continue this operational strategy into the future.
 - Material: We have 2100 tons of salt available which is a significant amount. We will treat the remainder of the salt with calcium and magnesium chloride soon.
 - Snow Emergency: We continue to have minor problems making this work effectively. There are explanations for this, but the best way to address the challenges is to meet with PD and identify the specific roadblocks and correct. Another "educational" tool we will use in the future is to remind

the operators at the pre-event meeting of the "even-odd" policy so they understand what side of the street a vehicle is to be parked legally.

Perhaps some of the problems PD is experiencing can be eliminated with a reminder to the operators about how the program works. Tickets written: 117. Vehicles towed: 11

- Other: Operators plowing Island Court encountered a Basketball Hoop extending over the roadway. This is illegal. Operators plowing Island Court encountered a boom from a tree trimming service extended over the roadway causing the operators to swerve around it. I have asked for the address of both residents and will send them a letter.

7. IEDA: The Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) today opened the application for the Workforce Housing Tax Credit Program (WHTC), established by House File 2448. The program makes state tax incentives available to developers building or rehabilitating housing in Iowa. To be eligible for the program, projects must meet one of four criteria:

- Housing development located on a grayfield or brownfield site
- Repair or rehabilitation of dilapidated housing stock
- Upper story housing development

8. Small Business Forgivable Loan: Awards are in process for Sign Pro's expansion (\$15,000) and Scott Lucas's new shop on Park Avenue (\$16,000). We have had several additional calls regarding the program. We have \$44,000 remaining in awards funds through 6/30/2015. 7/1 we begin round #2 of the program.
