Monthly report of the City Departments of the City of Muscatine

The City Administrator's Monthly Report is intended to provide a brief summary of City activities, with links to additional information where possible. Due to the variety and complexity of City functions, however, the report is not all-encompassing. JULY HIGHLIGHTS

In this report you will find detailed activity from City Departments for July 2021, such as:

- **City Administration** - Presented 31 regular agenda items for consideration by City Council during July. Provided presentations to City Council on the development of property maintenance codes, the MPW Electric Vehicle Charging Program, and an update on the American Rescue Plan Act funding.
- **Department of Public Works** - Staff has been taking advantage of the weather and filled 2,448 potholes during June, up from 1,057 in May and 1,000 in April, using 57 pounds of hot mix asphalt per hole. Three street projects were completed in June (concrete full depth, asphalt street overlay, and asphalt alley overlay). The Park Avenue Project is 73% complete and the 2nd Street Project is 68% complete. Both are scheduled to be completed by October 1.
- **Finance Department** – Continued submitting information to the State for FEMA grant reporting and responding to requests for additional information. Processed union and non-union pay increases effective 07/01/2021.
- **Parks and Recreation Department** – The 25th Annual College Search Kickoff July 22-25 was a success with many positive comments from those who attended. The Park Maintenance Division worked hard on preparing for and cleaning up after the 4th of July activities that took place on the Muscatine Riverfront. The fourth week of July brought several activities to town including the Almost Friday Fest, Hover Rally and CSK all taking place, and all were completed with great success!

- **Community Development Department** - Issued 73 permits with a project valuation of \$1.2 million, conducted 124 construction inspections, and 27 plan/permit reviews. The Heart and Soul project received a \$10,000 grant from the National Community Heart & Soul organization. Site plan reviews and permitting were completed for four significant projects including three housing projects and rehabilitation of the old Musser Library..
- **Housing Agency** – The Housing Counseling Program was recertified by HUD because the new Counselor passed the certification exam. Eight families were enrolled in the Family Self-Sufficiency Program.
- **Fire Department** - Had swearing in of Firefighter Daniel Nuci and Colton Pauls during council meeting on July 1, 2021. Firefighter Michael Fleming, Joseph Colon, and Spencer Ludman hired on July 12, 2021. Conducted recruit academy for new hires. Four week academy started on July 12, 2021.
- **Police Department** – Officers Angela Shoultz and Whitney Pena attended the Muscatine, Cedar, and Louisa County Fairs in July and had our What You Don't See Trailer available for parents to walk through. Several Officers were involved with the library staff filming Books and Badges. The Officers talked about various topics about law enforcement and their job responsibilities. They also read books during broadcasts that were aired on Pubic Access. Officer Nicole Blum took the time out of patrol to a residence of a 6 year old girl whose dad had called and asked if a female officer would be willing to talk to his daughter.

The citywide July safety training addressed emergency egress. Departments reviewed their emergency evacuation processes and identified areas of exit from each facility.



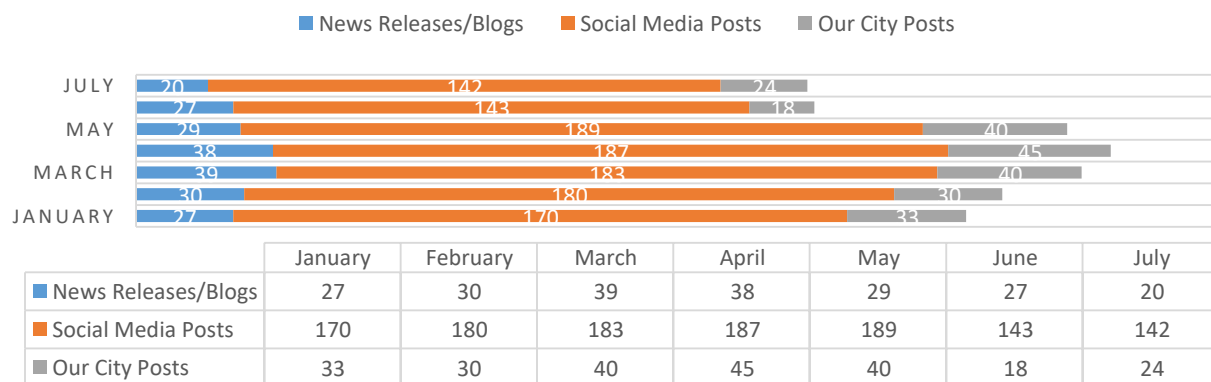
Department of Administration | Communications Division

YTD Construction Project Valuations



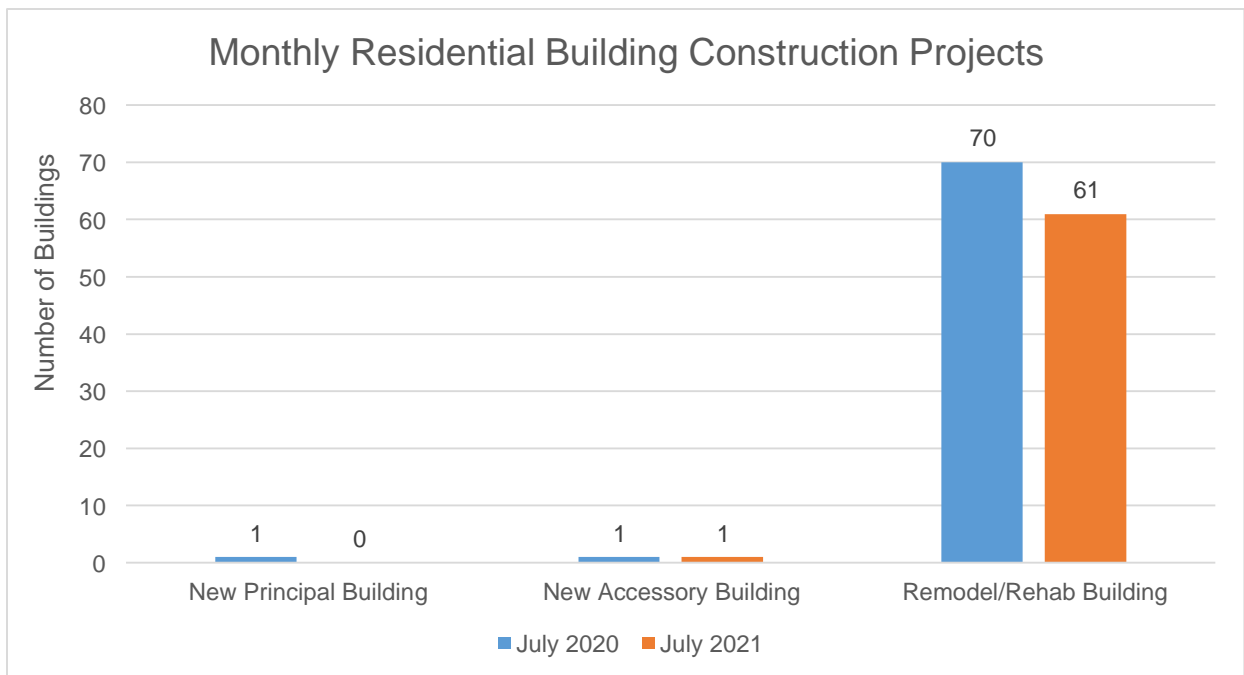
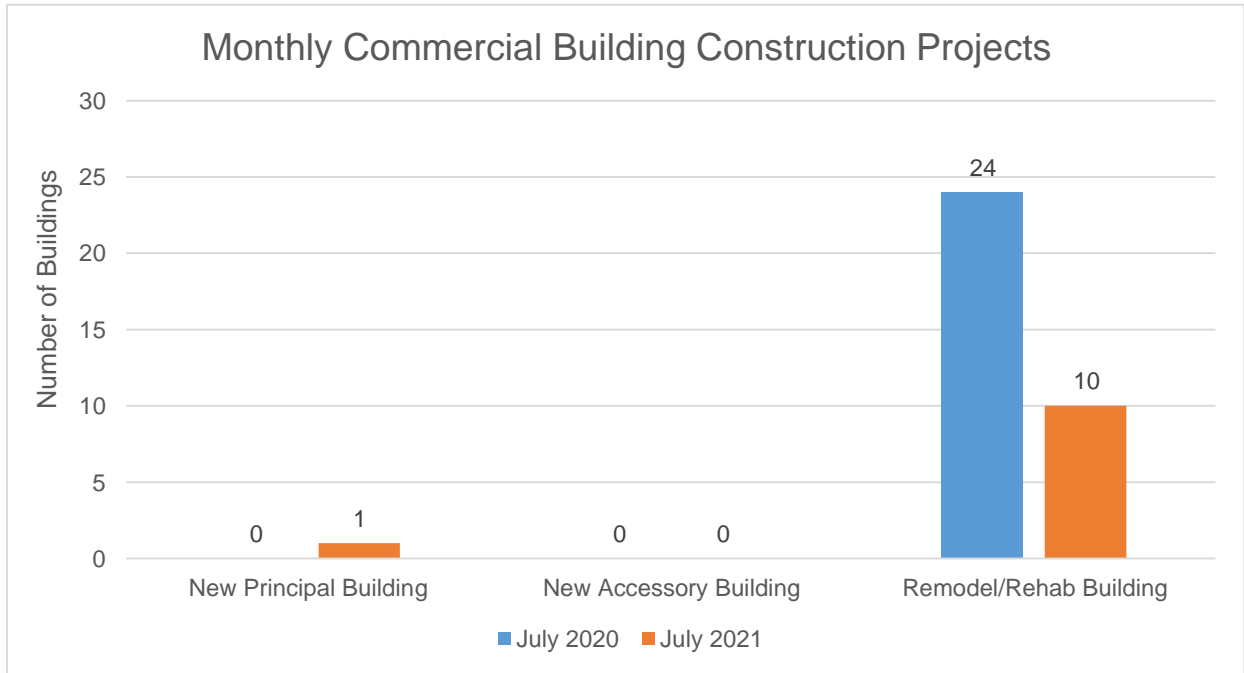

Other Community Development Activities:

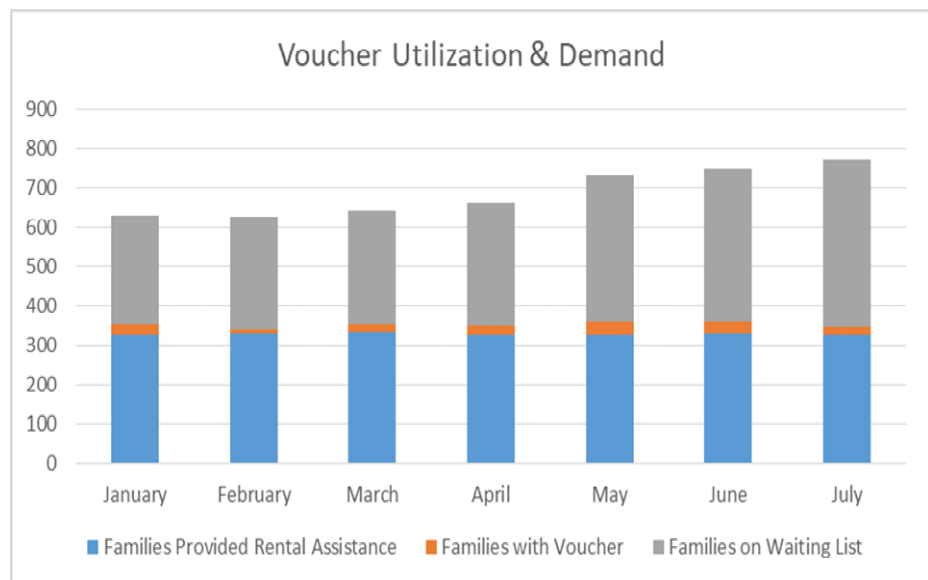
- ❖ National Community Heart & Soul awarded the City the \$10,000 seed grant, and initial kick off meetings have been held.
- ❖ Three responses were received to continue with the demolition of 4 additional nuisance properties.
- ❖ Staff participated in a follow up meeting with IEDA regarding the Mulberry neighborhood revitalization initiative and at their request revisions to the target area and proposed activities are being developed. Following that meeting a tour of the neighborhood was conducted with community partners.
- ❖ Site Plan Reviews and permitting were completed for 4 significant projects, including 3 housing projects and rehabilitation of the old Musser Library by the Stanley Center for Peace and Security.
- ❖ Housing inspections have resumed for all rental properties, focusing first on properties that were in the midst of the inspection process when the pandemic started.

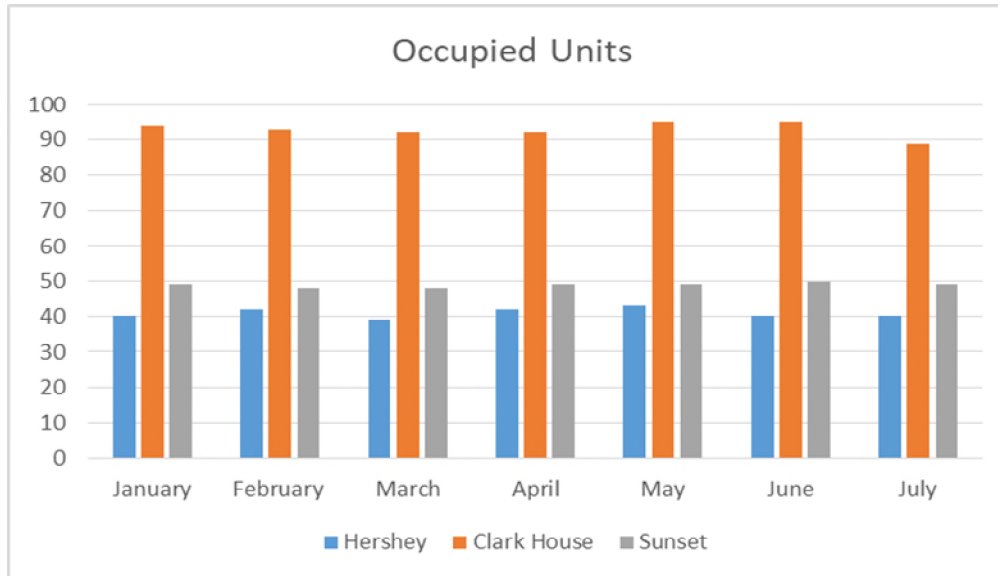
Housing Agency

- ❖ The Housing Counseling Program was recertified by HUD because the new Counselor passed the certification exam.
- ❖ One Financial Literacy Class was held.
- ❖ Eight families were enrolled in the Family Self-Sufficiency Program.
- ❖ The last clean up briefing was completed for households receiving a local preference that applied before the Agency transitioned to online applications, and 4 families began receiving assistance.
- ❖ The permanent chiller was placed at Hershey Manor.
- ❖ Across all 3 properties maintenance staff received 121 work order requests, more than 99% were completed within 24 hours.

In July the Voucher program:

- ❖ Paid \$143,950 to private landlords on behalf of assisted clients.
- ❖ Earned \$18,458 in administrative fees.
- ❖ Had a 9.2% increase in the number of households on the waiting list.





Occupancy remained low in July, however the number of applicants has continued to increase significantly. At the end of the month staff was processing 8 applications for tenancy.

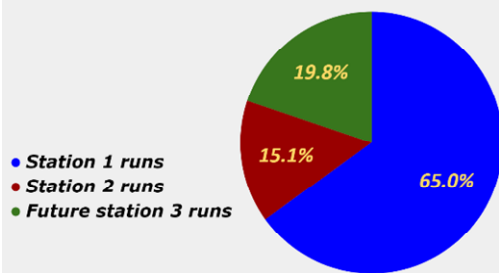

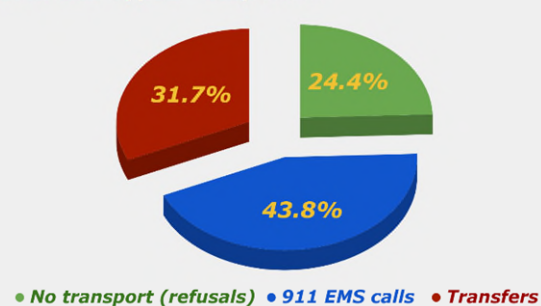

July Highlights

- Officers Angela Shoultz and Whitney Pena attended the Muscatine, Cedar, and Louisa County Fairs in July and had our "What You Don't See" trailer available for parents to walk through. This trailer is a learning tool for parents to see what a teenager's room may look like with drugs, drug paraphernalia and weapons hidden throughout the room. This gives them a better understanding of where kids may hide these items within their bedrooms.
- Several Officers were involved with the library staff filming Books and Badges. The Officers talked about various topics about law enforcement and their job responsibilities. They also read books during broadcasts that were aired on Pubic Access.
- Several Officers read books to the kids in the YMCA summer program.
- Detectives Adam Raisbeck and Jeff Devrieze helped Lt. Greg Bock from Salvation Army move a large refrigerator into the Salvation Army building.
- Sgt. Les Wegter arrested Sabrina Allen for an outstanding warrant (Scott Co.: extraditable; warrant resulted from misdemeanor criminal charges) as the result of a traffic stop wherein Allen was the identified operator. Allen expressed to Sgt. Wegter that she was the sole care provider for her children and had sufficient funds to post the necessary bond. Based on Allen's concerns, Sgt. Wegter made arrangements for Allen to secure the needed bond money through an ATM machine as well as assisted in expediting Allen's release from the Muscatine Co. Jail after arrest processing/booking. Through Sgt. Wegter's compassionate actions, Allen was able to return to her family in a timely manner.

She just wanted to become a Police Officer. Officer Blum went and talked to the girl, showed her the squad and took pictures with her and posted them on Facebook. The girl was very excited to talk to Officer Blum and hopefully will want to be an officer in the future.

- Corporal Matt Horton and Officer Blum presented information to the Muscatine Community School District Spark Program explaining our Evidence Technician Team procedures and crime scene procedures.
- The PD had an extra patrol at a property on Cleveland Street that was a former credit union. Officer Mark Schollmeyer called out there during a rainy stretch and found a couple with all of their property and they were soaking wet. Lt. Ryan Buss responded as back up. Lt. Buss bought them a bag of food and drinks from Kum & Go North. They were dropped off at Jesus Mission and given food and drinks.

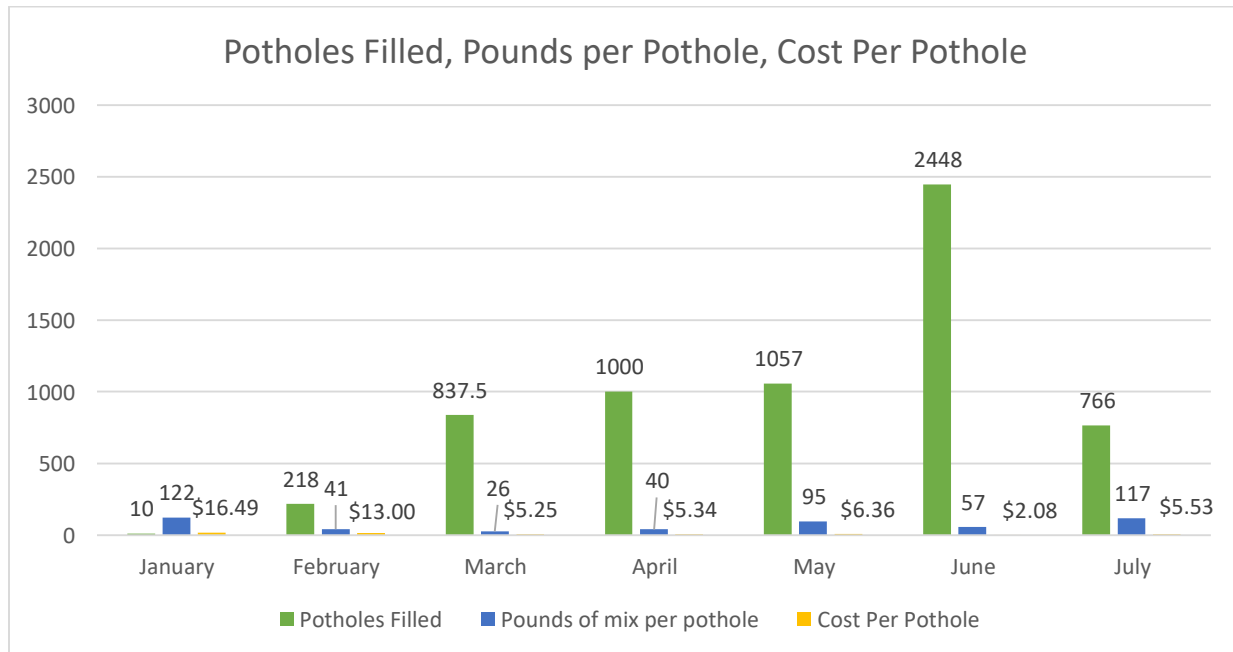


Department of Public Works (June 1-30, 2021)

The Public Works Department is composed of eight divisions which include: Administration, Building & Grounds Maintenance, Collection & Drainage, Engineering, Roadway Maintenance, Solid Waste, Transit (Muscabus), and Vehicle Maintenance. For budgeting purposes several of these divisions are broken down into subdivisions. For the purpose of the monthly report there will be several divisions that will be reporting consistently, while others may only be reporting on special events or accomplishments.

Roadway Maintenance Division Report July 2021:

Roadway Maintenance includes activities related to street repairs, snow removal, traffic control, and street cleaning. They are responsible for over 254 lane miles of streets within the city limits.



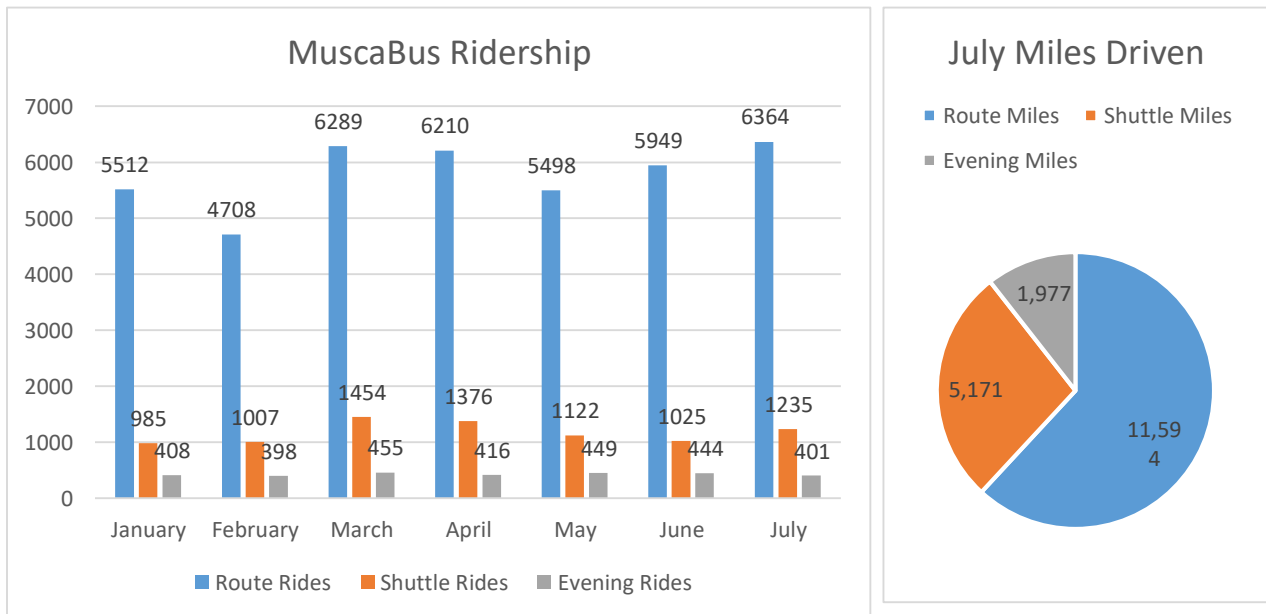
This measure indicates the number of potholes filled, the amount of material used to fill the hole in pounds, and the cost to fill each pothole. Beginning January 20, 2021, a "standard" pothole is defined as being the size of large pizza box. Potholes will be divided no smaller than one half of a pizza box.

Building and Grounds Activities for July 2021:

This month in addition to their regular duties including cleaning, plumbing, electrical, HVAC work, supply ordering and delivery, and other regular repairs, staff have been mowing, weed eating, and spraying. Additionally, staff ran wiring and installed two ceiling fans on the apparatus floor at the Public Safety Building. They also upgraded the lighting in the front of the weight room and repaired the ice maker in the Fire Department. Staff repaired bay doors 2 and 5, a urinal, the generator case, and the lawn mower at the South Fire Station. Staff fixed the lawn sprinkler systems at the Airport and the Library, repaired the lighted street sign at Walnut and Mississippi Drive, finished washing windows at the library, replaced benches for the Transit Department and repaired roof leaks at various buildings. In addition, staff repaired the air conditioning unit in the Finance Department, removed surplus items from the library and put them in storage for auction, repaired emergency lights at the library and Art Center and oversaw completion of the warranty work on the chiller at the Art Center. All of this was done while one staff member was attending class for air conditioning and heat pump training and several were on vacation at various times throughout the month.

Transit Summary of Operations for July 2021:

MuscaBus is the city's transit service. It operates four fixed routes, shuttle service, and evening service.



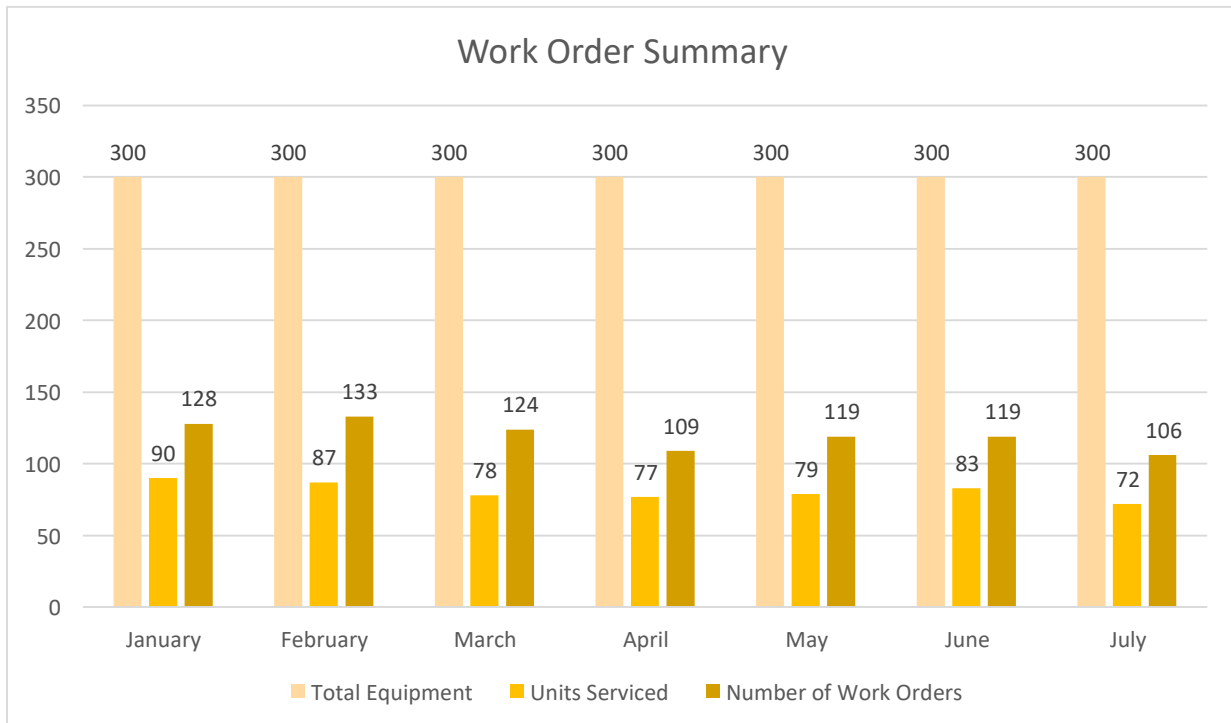

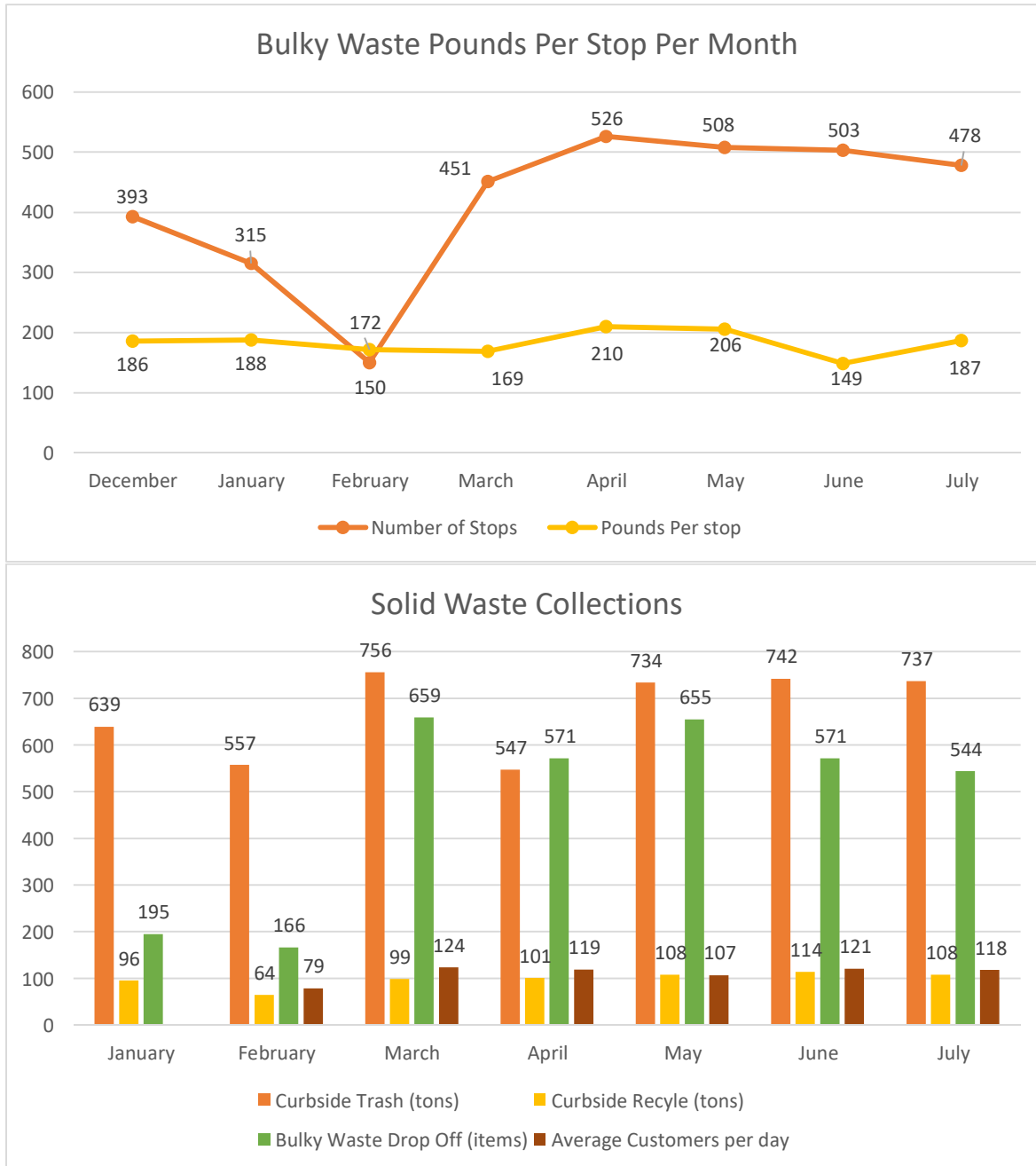
Vehicle Maintenance Division Report July 2021:

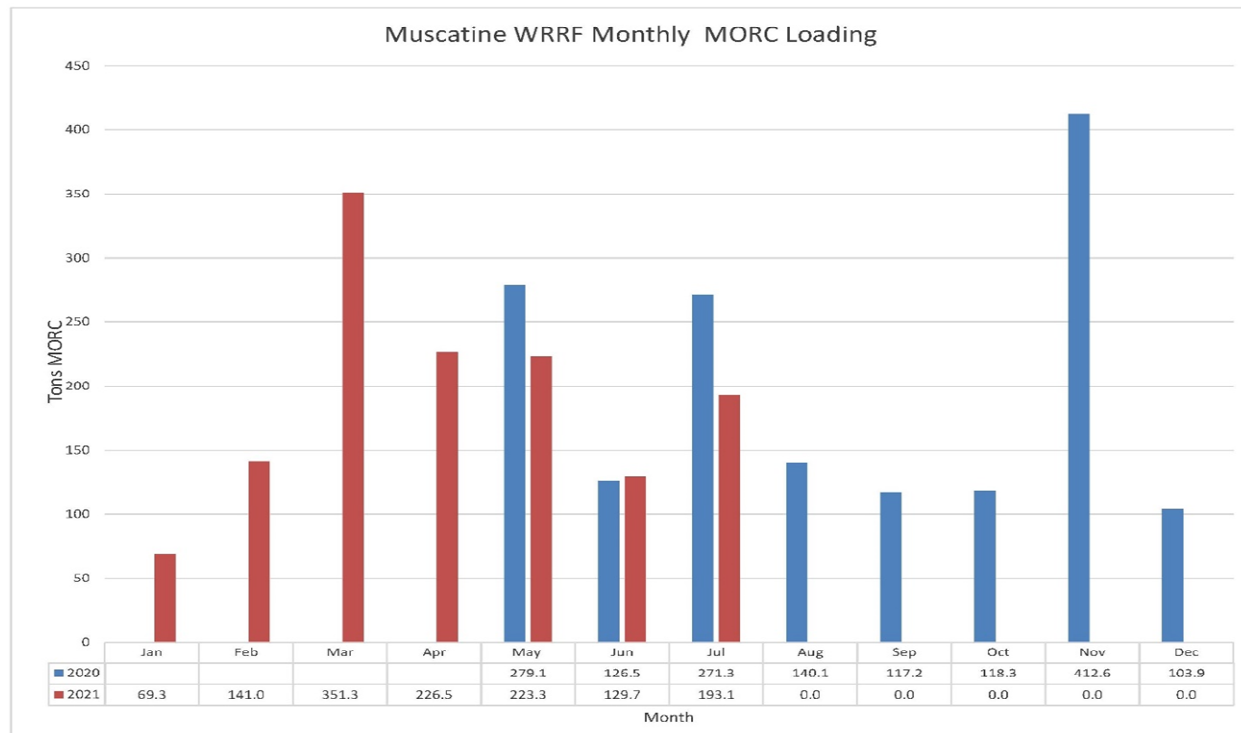
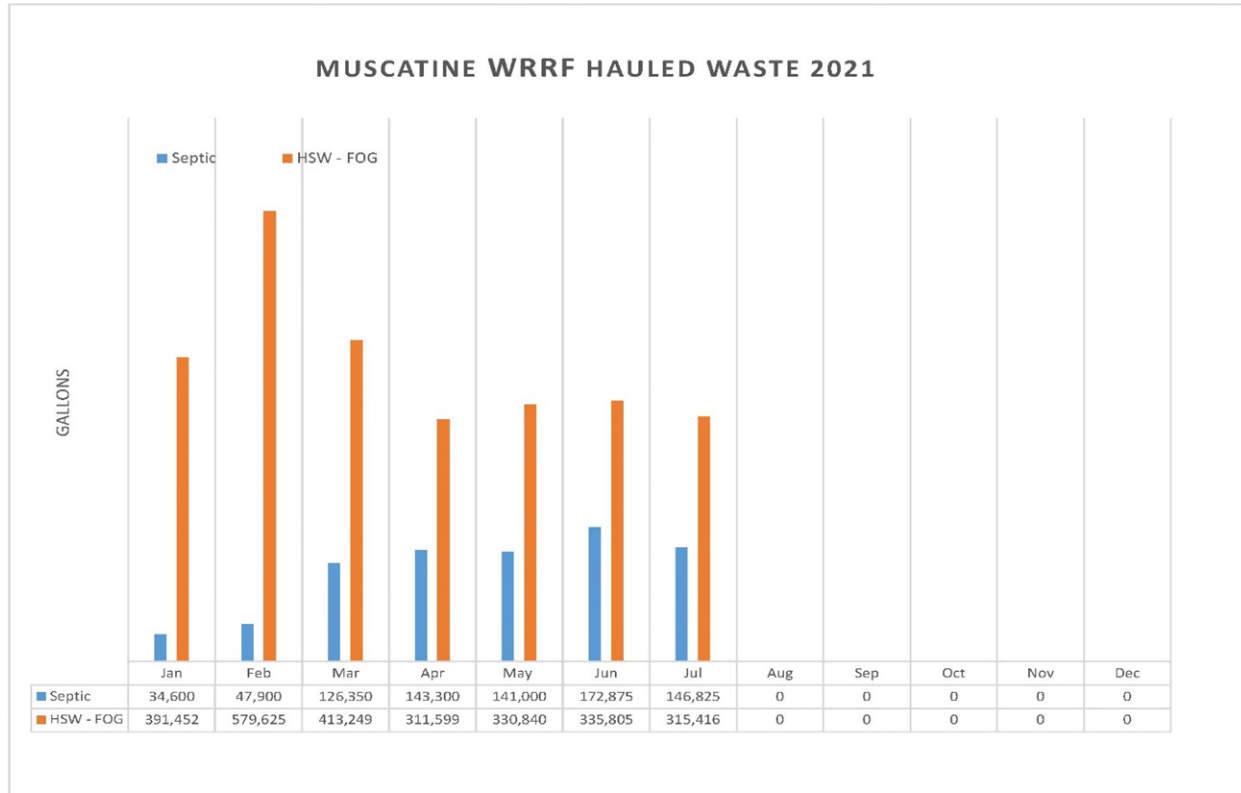
The Solid Waste Division consists of activities related to refuse collection, transfer station, compost site, and landfill, as well as overseeing the contracted recycling collection.

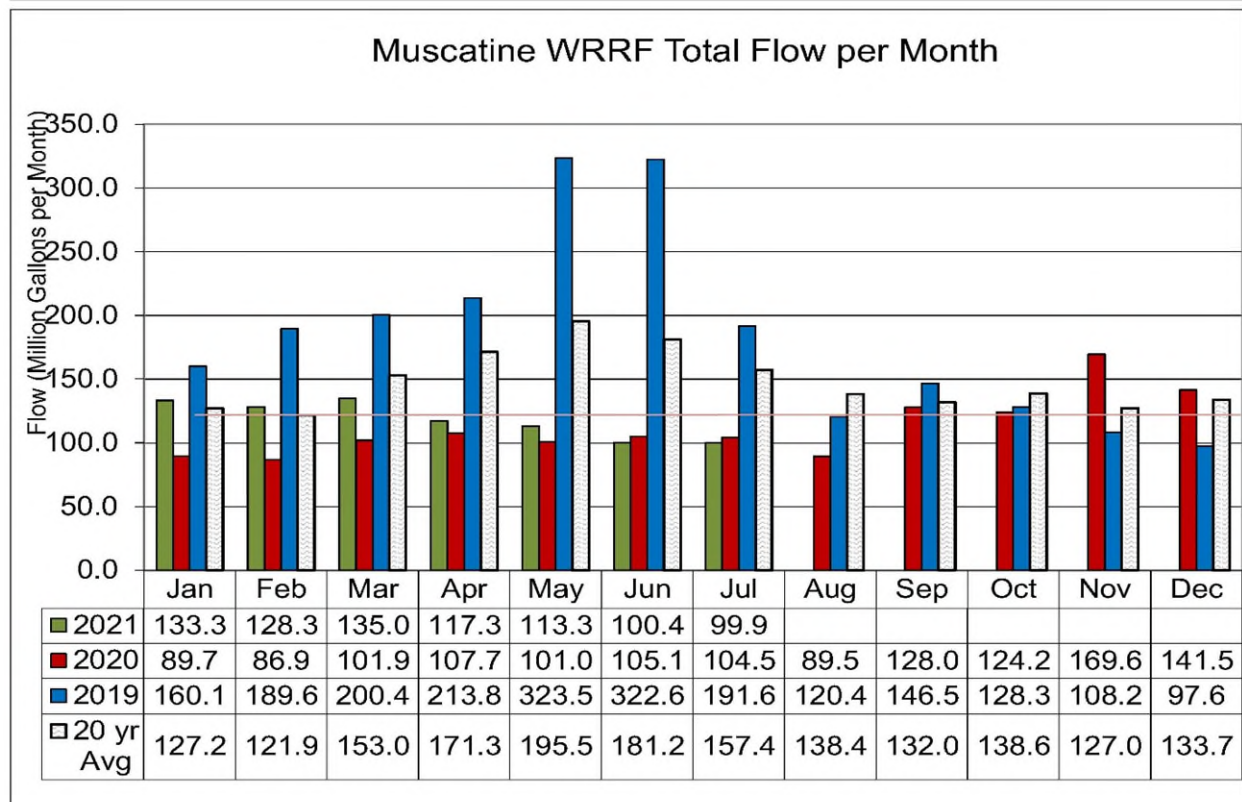
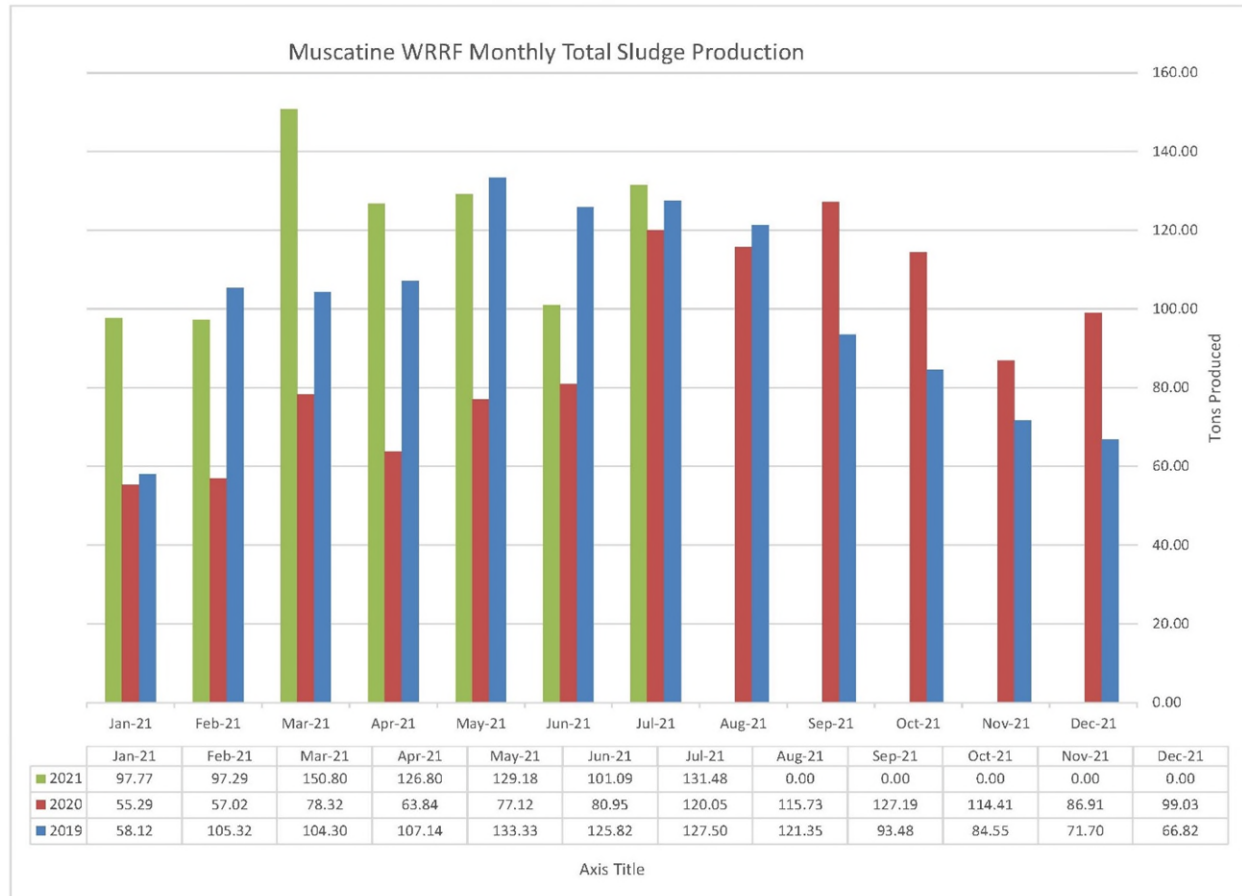


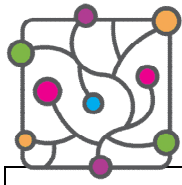
