September Highlights


- Presented 37 agenda items for consideration by the Muscatine City Council during their regular meetings.


September Highlights




- Principal Building defined as the construction of new building on a previously vacant lot/parcel.

- Remodel/Rehab defined as buildings undergoing any alterations whether it be for a remodel or repair.




September 2024 Highlights



Property Conditions defined as Nuisance Abatements and other Code Violations including but not limited to dangerous tree trimming/removal, zoning regulation violations, etc.



- Demolition of 417 Mulberry Avenue was completed and interior work on the replacement is ahead of schedule. This will allow Flickinger Learning Center to safely resume normal operations.
- The public input process for the 2025 Comprehensive Plan – Make It Muscatine – kicked off with a series of focus groups and a meeting of the Steering Committee. RDG also launched the project website (<https://rdgusa.mysocialpinpoint.com/planmuscatine/plan-muscatine-page-1/>), which includes an interactive map to collect ideas for future projects/identify areas of need.
- Over the past 24 months 36 property maintenance notices have been sent, resulting in the repair or sale of 24 properties, with active permits for additional 12 homes.
- Applications for funding through the Paul Bruhn Grant are being scored by the review committee and will be presented to the Historic Preservation Commission in October to proceed with design work with selected architect.
- Spark Consulting hosted a public meeting to educate residents and recruit volunteers for the intensive survey for the Underground Railroad nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.
- RFPs were released for the demolition of 3 derelict properties in the Ignite Vitality: Mulberry neighborhood; this will prepare the sites for construction 2 single family homes for first-time homebuyers and a 21-unit Permanent Support Housing Complex.
- The Mulberry project team also selected the vendor for development of the pocket part at 6th and Orange streets.
- Lead Program staff began accepting applications for assistance with lead remediation in qualified homes and issued the request for proposals for lead inspections and construction management services.
- Lead Safe Worker and Contract training was provided to 14 workers contractors from 5 companies to support implementation of the Lead Hazard Reduction Grant

Muscatine Municipal Housing Agency


- HUD notified staff that we will be able to begin issuing vouchers again in December to facilitate leasing in January when we are released from shortfall conditions
- 1 family graduated from the Family Self-Sufficiency Program and received a \$17,761 check from the escrow they built up while participating in the program
- 3 units at Sunset Park were taken off-line to allow for foundation repairs
- 1 client with project-based voucher began receiving rental assistance for the first time
- 1 family completed in the Spanish first-time homebuyer course and is now looking for their new home
- Housing Counseling staff partnered with WeLead to offer a budgeting workshop attended by 9 families
- 2 families received \$2,500 in down payment assistance to purchase their first home! 2 families are in the process of purchasing their first home with our new program providing up to \$20,000 in down payment assistance.
- 2 staff participated in training for working with individuals in crisis: How to Manage Problematic Behaviors (Compassionately)

Voucher Rental Assistance Use & Demand



- The Housing Counselor completed every step of the 9/11 stair climb!
- Occupancy was 93%
- Turned 2 units for new occupants
- Completed 53 workers in an average of 1 day
- Paid \$173,472 for housing and utility assistance on behalf of 371 families
- \$9,810 was deposited into escrow accounts for families working toward improved self-sufficiency, with 1 graduation in September
- Earned \$26,401 in administrative fees

Park Maintenance Division

The month of September brought many special events to our park sites including: Live to Love Service, A Muskie Cross Country Run, Muscatine Farmers Market, Keep Muscatine Beautiful Almost Friday Fest, Walk to End Alzheimer's, American Cruise Line FestivALL, Viva Muscatine and 5K running events. Staff has also been working hard in closing down and winterizing the Muscatine Aquatic Center. Riverfront buildings and shelters throughout our parks were very well utilized during the great weather in September. Staff began working on cleaning out the landscape beds throughout the parks in preparation for the upcoming winter season.

Aquatics Division

The Aquatic Center closed for the season on September 2nd (Labor Day). Pool Party reservations are available to be made by contacting the Parks and Recreation Department office at (563) 263-0241. Swim Lesson programming began on May 31st with 362 individual enrollments and finished for the year on August 2. The Aquatic Center is scheduled to be repainted this fall.

Cemetery Division

Greenwood Cemetery remains open to the public for walkers, bicyclists and the Community's cemetery needs. The Cemetery Steps are also open for public use. Staff continues to work on leveling gravesites, edging the roadways, and repairing foundations throughout the Cemetery. Staff have been working hard on some Chapel improvements: the landscape beds have been expanded and a fresh coat of paint has been added. Staff also worked hard on preparing the grounds for the Cemetery Walk that took place on Sunday, September 22. Staff will be preparing for the Fall Cleanup week which will take place in October.

Wellness Division

The Wellness Committee is scheduled for monthly meetings on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. The City Employee Wellness Center program relaunch began September to expand the offerings to the employees, including wellness challenges and new activities, such as yoga. The Fitness Reimbursement program continues throughout the year.

Department of Parks and Recreation

Recreation Division

Youth and adult recreation programs and special events continue to be offered. Recreational programming including the Youth Sport Shorts program and the Walking Club continued during August. Seasonal Recreation staff continue to be hired and are to be trained for recreation programming. The Fall/Winter Activity Brochure was revealed in late August and registration for Fall Recreation programs including Flag Football, Youth Gymnastics, Sports Starters, Youth sport clinics, Basketball, Adult Coed Volleyball and more began on August 27th. The 2024 Cemetery Walk occurred on September 22 with 72 participants and 5 volunteers. Upcoming events for the Parks and Recreation include the Fall Festival at the Pearl City Vintage Market and the Trunk or Treat event.

Soccer Complex Division

We hosted two different weekends' soccer tournaments this month. The first group was Muscatine Soccer Club (MSC) hosting their fall classic. MSC utilized 13 different fields hosting 90 teams and 147 matches. Second event was hosted by Pearl City Soccer Club and brought Quad City Men's All-Star teams here for an 8-team tournament with an Exhibition match between Honduras versus Mexico after their championship game. This event brought 700-800 people in for the event. Throughout the month we continue to have groups playing games. Groups include Community YMCA, Muscatine Soccer Club-youth, and adult league, Pearl City Soccer Club- youth and adult league, ILLOWA and ISA. Post tournament field work included over seed entire fields, rolling, and slicing. We have been continuing to make improvements to the park, filling in low areas, repairing divots, and staff continues to repair sprinkler heads for better playability, and edging valve box lids for easier access when servicing the sprinklers. We have installed new LED scoreboards on fields 3 and 4. Also the lights have been moved from Soccer West field 11 (where the Indoor Sports Complex is being built) to field 1 in the main complex. Muscatine Indoor Sports Complex Project has started the dirt work and site preparations. We have not been able to fill some of the open positions, as we have offered positions, but they were no shows or work one day and never came back.

Kent Stein Division

Kent Stein Park hosted two one day softball tournaments. These tournaments were sponsored from one of our local softball groups- The Monsters softball organization. The Saturday tournament hosted 33 teams and used 8 fields. These games were in the 8U- up to high school divisions. The Sunday tournament hosted 28 teams and hosted 12U to High School aged utilizing 6 fields. Staff has been maintaining field for daily use. During the regular week Kent Stein Park host our local MYB (Muscatine Youth Baseball) fall season, Monster's softball, MGSA softball, MSC and Adult softball (2 divisions- Women's and Co-ed). Staff has started to change out light bulbs in both restrooms to LED bulbs. Staff has been replenishing Ag lime on skinned areas for normal wear patterns. Kent Stein was also to take part in Muscatine High School Cross country meet this year. We have filled some of the personnel to back fill positions as students went back to school, but still could use more.

Golf Divisions

The golf course hosted three outings in September. All of the leagues except one wrapped up in September. The last one will wrap up the first week of October. Staff continues to do trainings on Cash Handling Expectations and Customer Service Skills. Staff has begun to look forward to 2025 on how to improve certain areas and continue to grow as a staff while hanging on until the end of the 2024 Season. Through September we are 1,751 rounds ahead of 2023.

Golf Maintenance aerified and sanded all greens to relieve compaction and get air to the roots. Staff seeded and fertilized all tees, including the driving range. Staff plans on opening the driving range and par 3 tees up again soon. Aerifying of fairways, collars and approaches have been started with the goal of being completed by early October.


Department of Public Works

September 2024 Highlights

The Public Works Department is composed of eight divisions which include: Administration, Building & Grounds Maintenance, Collection & Drainage, Engineering, Roadway Maintenance, Solid Waste, Transit (Muscabus), and Vehicle Maintenance. For budgeting purposes several of these divisions are broken down into subdivisions. For the purpose of the monthly report there will be several divisions that will be reporting consistently, while others may only be reporting on special events or accomplishments.

Roadway Maintenance Division

Roadway Maintenance includes activities related to street repairs, snow removal, traffic control, and street cleaning. They are responsible for over 254 lane miles of streets within the city limits.




This measure indicates the number of potholes filled, and the approximate cost to fill each pothole. Beginning January 20, 2021, a "standard" pothole is defined as being the size of a large pizza box. Potholes will be divided no smaller than one half of a pizza box. Beginning in April of 2022, we began tracking pavement repairs separately from potholes. This has lowered the pothole numbers as many of them were previously counted in larger pavement patches.

In addition to their normal duties, the Roadway Maintenance and Collection & Drainage Divisions of Public Works began flood fighting operations at the end of June. They closed flood gates 1 and 2 in accordance to our flood plan and set up multiple detours for road closures and July 4th events that were relocated from the riverfront onto Mississippi Drive.

Building and Grounds Activities:


The Buildings and Grounds Division of the Public Works Department is responsible for the upkeep and repair of city facilities, grounds, and equipment. The division is responsible for maintaining the following facilities and grounds: Art Center, City Hall, Library, Public Safety Building, Public Works, South Fire Station, and certain maintenance functions at the Airport.



This chart indicates the number of work activities and the hours committed to them per month. Administrative tasks include ordering equipment and materials, requesting and receiving bids and quotes for work or supplies, project oversight, delivery of building supplies, training and paid time off. Corrective maintenance tasks are unscheduled repairs or work done on as-needed or emergency basis. Preventive maintenance tasks include routine, scheduled maintenance items. Cleaning includes building cleaning and janitorial services. This chart is being capped at six month intervals so that the numbers are legible.

Vehicle Maintenance Division:

The Vehicle Maintenance Division services and repairs approximately 331 pieces of equipment and vehicles from all city departments with the exception of the fire trucks and ambulances.





Transit Summary of Operations:


MuscaBus is the city's transit service. It operates four fixed routes, shuttle service, and evening service.

MuscaBus Ridership




- “Utility Locates Cleared” indicates the areas that have no utilities to be marked




Collection & Drainage Division:

The Collection & Drainage Division is responsible for inspecting and maintaining the city's sanitary, storm, and combined sewer systems. This includes 993 storm water manholes, 2,407 sanitary sewer manholes, 151 combined sewer manholes, 2,840 stormwater catch basins, 112 miles of sanitary sewer and 68 miles of storm sewer pipe.






Water Pollution Control Plant






- Chief Kies recited the oath of office as the Interim City Administrator.
